The RIVER WATCH PROGRAM is a statewide, water quality monitoring program for citizen scientists of all ages. This program, which is a partnership with Colorado Parks & Wildlife, is comprised of volunteers from over 130 different public, private, and charter school groups, watershed organizations, and private individuals who monitor

over 300 different rivers and streams throughout Colorado each year, making the program the largest collector of data in the state. You can help the RW team in your area through CWA membership and by a direct, tax deductible contribution to the RW Program on our website.

The INFLOW NETWORK is an electronic information network designed to engage water interested groups and citizens in state water policy and provide up to date information, such as funding opportunities, job openings, trainings and events. WATERSHED PLANNING – The Assembly continues to work with our member groups and funding partners to create a useful resource for local watershed planning efforts. 

HIGHLIGHTS

STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

The 2013 Sustaining Colorado Watersheds Conference, Water: What is the New Normal?, in Avon, CO was another success, with over 200 participants enjoying interactive workshops, engaging speakers, and energizing networking opportunities. Over 92% of our evaluation respondents found the overall conference value to be "very high" or "high". This conference is incredibly important to our efforts to connect watershed groups with statewide resources.

CITIZEN SCIENCE

The Colorado Watershed Assembly continues to be a leader in citizen science. From 2013-2014, the number of River Watch groups grew to 135. Our dedicated volunteers are key to providing high quality data to decision makers while fostering lifelong environmental stewards. In 2014, our volunteers collected samples on over 300 river sites throughout Colorado, providing important baseline data to state agencies.

This year, River Watch collaborated with the Water Quality Control Division (WQCD) to collect macroinvertebrates (bugs) on 20 of their 25 priority sites. This data was used by the WQCD to refine biological indicators that measure the health of rivers.

River Watch data also contributed to the development of the Colorado Water Quality Control Commission's newly adopted standards for nitrogen and phosphorus. Nutrients are among the nation's priority pollutants and setting these standards helps Colorado maintain the high quality waters we depend on.

COLORADO DATA SHARING NETWORK (CDSN)

CWA has been the fiscal sponsor for the Colorado Water Quality Monitoring Council (CWQMC) for the past 5 years. In 2013 and 2014, we helped bring legal review and fiscal structure to this hardworking group of professional volunteers who have created the CDSN. The CDSN's mission is to facilitate water quality monitoring and seamless data sharing among all interested parties to characterize water quality in Colorado. COLORADO HEATHY RIVERS FUND (CHRF)

Since the establishment of the Colorado Healthy Rivers Fund in 2003, over 125,000 citizens have donated more than \$1,099,000 by using a convenient tax return checkoff to fund more than 72 local water enhancement projects in Colorado. The CHRF is administered through Colorado Water Conservation Board in association with the Water Quality Control Division and Colorado Watershed Assembly.
