 - Working Farms and Ranchlands




Natural Resources Conservation Service Who We Are

Colorado Rapid Watershed Assessments


- Provide a natural resource snapshot and overview of each Colorado 8-digit Hydrologic Unit Code (HUC-8)
- Provide initial estimates of where conservation investments will best address concerns of landowners and other stakeholders
- A process that evaluates resource conditions on an 8-digit hydrologic basis
- Intended to inform decision makers by providing basic information needed to set priorities and determine actions to achieve goals



- Estimated future conservation practice application and associated costs
















Colorado Soils Program Ensuring High Quality, Productive Soils


- Complete soils surveys of all lands within Colorado by 2011
- Provide quality soil and related resource information
- •Increase the use of soil information in decision-making processes of land managers

- Increase application of soil quality principles in order to:
 - Reduce erosion
 - Improve soil health
 - Improve water quality
 - Assist with nutrient management
- Increase the education and awareness of soil resources in Colorado

Colorado Snow Survey Program

The Colorado NRCS Snow Survey Program provides mountain snowpack data and stream flow forecasts for Colorado. Common applications of snow survey products include water supply management, flood control, climate modeling, recreation, and conservation planning.





Colorado Snow Survey Program Snow Courses

- Large manual climate network
- Began in 1936 in Colorado
- Approximately 100 remote sites in Colorado
- Generally high elevation areas
- Monthly measurements
- Collect Snow Depth and Snow Water Equivalent (SWE)



Colorado Snow Survey Program SNOTEL—SNOpack TELemetry

- Large automated climate network
- •Began in 1978
- Approximately 110 remote sites in Colorado
- Utilizes meteor burst communication technology to telemeter data
- •Allows for daily reports for snow and precipitation data available online
- Provides critical information for water management decision-making

Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (PL-566) in Colorado

- Authorizes NRCS to provide technical and financial assistance to local organizations in planning and carrying out watershed projects
- The program works through local government sponsors to help participants solve natural resource and related economic problems in a specific watershed




Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (PL-566) in Colorado

- Projects must address one or more of the following purposes:
 - Watershed Protection
 - Flood Prevention
 - Agricultural Water Management
 - Non-agricultural Water Management
 - Ground Water Recharge
 - Water Quality Management
 - Municipal and Industrial Water Supply





Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Program

- Enacted by Congress in 1974
- Authorized the construction, operation, and maintenance of salinity control works in the Colorado River Basin
- A long-term , interstate and interagency public/private partnership effort
- Reduces salinity preventing salts from dissolving and mixing with the river's flow







Colorado NRCS Watershed Partnership Programs

Agricultural Water Enhancement Program (AWEP)
 (National NRCS Projects)

Purpose is to promote ground and surface water conservation and improve water quality (EQIP)

Colorado AWEP Projects

- Republican River Water Conservation District—water conservation, sustainable land conversion from irrigated to dryland farming, grazing lands, wildlife habitat
- Neegronda Irrigation Partners (Lower Arkansas)—water conservation, sustainable land conversion from irrigated to dryland farming, grazing lands, wildlife habitat
- Central Colorado Water Conservancy District (South Platte)—water conservation, high tech irrigation monitoring, internal district member water trading market and management


Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative (CCPI)
 (National NRCS Projects)

Purpose is to promote ground and surface water conservation and improve water quality (CSP, EQIP, WHIP)

- Colorado CCPI Projects
 - Rio Grande Headwaters Restoration Trust—riparian restoration, in-stream improvements
 - Lake County Conservation District Upper Arkansas Restoration
 Project—water quality improvements, riparian and stream
 restoration, irrigation and riparian grazing lands practices

Sage Grouse


- EQIP and WHIP—approximately \$769,000
- Brush management, fencing, herbaceous weed control, pasture/hayland planting, pest management, water facilities, pipeline, upland wildlife habitat management

Lesser Prairie Chicken

- EQIP and WHIP—approximately \$280,000
- Mineral placement, avoid lek disturbance, remove or mark problem fences, avoid new fragmentation, avoid new conversions, prescribed grazing, improve expired CRP




Where Sage Grouse Occur







Where Prairie Chickens Occur






