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Message from the Director Sustainability – It's a word we use often these days when re

Sustainability – It's a word we use often these days when referring to the enduring characteristics and goals of the many projects organizations propose to improve the health of our watersheds. Maybe too much, but with the current status of our economy it is as relevant as ever. We are continually being asked to do more with less and the need to build consensus and partnerships has never been greater. This is what local citizen watershed groups do best. Their ability to reach out to neighbors with differing backgrounds on issues universal to the well-being of the community is vital to educating the public and implementing projects that improve the watershed for the benefit of all. Without these diplomatic stewards many projects could never be accomplished. Agencies, consultants, legislators and volunteer organizations often rely on these grassroots groups to coordinate with, and navigate through, the maze of special interests and personal priorities that make up the fabric of our lives today.

The Colorado Watershed Assembly is dedicated to the support of these local organizations. Our programs and services are designed to engage citizens and identify opportunities that further their missions. Our River Watch program educates several hundred middle and high school students each year on the importance of water quality monitoring. Our volunteer program has influenced the lives of over 70,000 Colorado students since the program began in 1989 and is currently the largest generator of water quality data in the State. This year we processed a record 7,980 metal samples, 1,053 nutrient samples and 28 macroinvertebrate samples from 551 active stations statewide. We are taking on 10 new teams this year and demand for water quality data has never been higher.

The Colorado Data Sharing Network makes water quality data from River Watch and other sources available to the public and our free weekly e-newsletter informs hundreds of subscribers of funding opportunities, events, training programs, conferences, jobs and relevant news. The Measureable Results Program independently documents the milestones, successes and failures of stream restoration projects and our new survey equipment allows us to precisely monitor more projects with new partners. The annual "Sustaining Colorado Watersheds" conference networks citizen groups with other organizations and agencies to build collaborative projects with partners they didn't know existed. The Assembly advocates

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for the interests of local groups at the state and federal level and works with them individually to build stakeholder coalitions, develop watershed plans and implement enhancement projects.

The Colorado Watershed Assembly is proud to be a part of the statewide sustainable effort to bring awareness and improvement to the environmental health of the Headwaters State. We encourage you find your own way to engage in local community efforts to protect our most valuable resource – our water.

WE STARTED WITH SIX SCHOOLS ON THE YAMPA AND GREW TO COVER ALL WATERSHEDS IN COLORADO AND 350 SCHOOLS. SINCE 1989 WE HAVE INVOLVED OVER 70,000 INDIVIDUALS IN COLORADO, PROVIDED DATA ON 3,000 STATIONS COVERING OVER 300 RIVERS. WE HAVE ALSO GROWN TO INCLUDE INDIVIDUALS. WATERSHED GROUPS AND OTHER ENTITIES, BESIDES SCHOOLS, IN OUR PROGRAM WE HAVE EXPANDED OUR PROGRAM TO INCLUDE BIOLOGICAL AND PHYSICAL HABITAT PARAMETERS. SOME STUDENTS HAVE RECEIVED COLLEGE CREDIT FOR THEIR RIVER WATCH SKILLS, OTHERS HAVE ACQUIRED WATER-RELATED EMPLOYMENT FROM THEIR INTEREST AND WORK IN RIVER WATCH, AND MOST HAVE CARRIED THEIR KNOWLEDGE AND PASSION FOR THE RIVER ENVIRONMENT WHERE EVER THEY GO.

Recent River Watch Data Use: Providing scientifically sound data to decision makers Colorado Division of Wildlife regularly uses the data to protect the health of fisheries, which in turn influences Colorado recreation and tourism.

Multiple grassroots-level watershed groups utilize RW data.



If you are interested in helping River Watch in this effort, some of the typical costs are: \$3000 will provide a new RW team with all their needs for the first year. \$1800 will set up a new station for an existing group. \$1000 will cover all costs for an existing group (supplies, lab costs, etc.). \$300 will provide a team with monitoring supplies for one year.

\$200 will send a new volunteer to a RW training.

\$100 will cover the costs associated with one site visit.

RIVER WATCH

• The Water Quality Control Commission uses RW data as a primary source for settling and reviewing standards.

- In 2009, new temperature standards were introduced in the Northern Platte, Republican, and Arikaree River Basins using RW data.
- The Commission has been reviewing and adopting numeric criteria for
- macroinvertebrate community health; creating a reference river database (comparing healthy to impaired); and developing nutrient standards for nitrogen and phosphorus.

Colorado Data Sharing Network -

is a collaborative project started by the Colorado Water Quality Monitoring Council (CWQMC) in 2004. It was formed to solve many of the historic barriers to effective sharing of water quality data in Colorado. CDSN products and services seek to satisfy reporting requirements for Colorado NPS (Non-Point Source) project sponsors. The CDSN project addresses the top priorities echoed throughout the collective watershed management, assessment and monitoring community in Colorado including the Colorado Water Quality Control Division, local governments, private entities and non-profit organizations. The Colorado Data Sharing Network project continues to provide the Colorado Water Quality Monitoring Council a collective and resourceful voice for monitoring issues in the future.

Ambient Water Quality Monitoring System (AWQMS) -

AWQMS is a web-based water quality data management system that includes support for batch import and export, data management, reporting, graphing, and optional data submission to the National Data Warehouse.

AWQMS meets National STORET/WQX requirements, however users can opt to NOT upload to the National Data Warehouse STORET/WQX. Data in our regional database contains all National STORET data and other Colorado data. CDSN has loaded legacy data sets from a subset of past Non Point Source (NPS) projects, all present and future NPS projects and selected non NPS Projects. Any entity can load data at any time to the system by following the guidance and user support CDSN provides. AWQMS is a holistic data management system that also supports an interactive web-based map, shares meta-data, and meets Colorado's NPS Grant Program requirements.

CDSN Products & Services -

- AWQMS Database and supporting materials (for water quality, biological, and stream habitat data) — is the new, more powerful, and increasingly user-friendly, WQX-compatible toolkit used to submit and retrieve data from the CDSN project database;
- Interactive Google-map & data download utility to find & download CDSN, USGS, and National STORET/WQX water quality data—in one place!
- Data SWAPS & trainings in your watershed;
- Data Calls in coordination with Colorado Department of Public Health (CDPHE);
- Mentoring Watershed Project Design & Quality Assurance Assistance; Data Formatting & Upload Assistance (by Colorado Water Quality Monitoring Council);
- CDSN also offers trainings, tutoring, webinars, and custom data formatting and upload/ download training.

MEASURABLE RESULTS PROGRAM

The Measurable Results Program (MRP) seeks to scientifically document the effects of restoration efforts on Colorado's rivers while helping to enhance the overall quality and quantity of stream restoration monitoring data around the State. The Program was launched in 2010 as a collaborative effort between the Colorado Watershed Assembly the Department of Public Health and Environment's Nonpoint Source Program, and the Colorado Water Conservation Board's Watershed Restoration Program.





Example projects being monitored by the MRP in 2011:

- Rio Grande Headwaters Restoration Project
- Alamosa River Restoration Project in Capulin
- Eagle River Restoration Project in Edwards
- Arkansas River at Hecla Junction in Salida
- Coal Creek Restoration Project in Crested Butte
- Town of Alma Sediment Reduction Project

In the past year the MRP has worked to develop a toolbox of monitoring procedures and parameters that can be applied to systematically and quantitatively measure the changes to the chemical, biological, and physical attributes of river systems as a result of restoration practices.

Periodical resurveys of established sites will document the environmental impact benefits of the restoration activities over time. The types of data generated through the MRP are diverse and while tailored to project goals on a case by case basis the data that is generated is expected to be useful to watershed professionals across the state.

Projects are frequently evaluated on 4 levels:

- 1. Chemical
- 2. Biological
- 3. Physical
- 4. Remote sensing

The documentation of these qualities will help the program report on those results and identify and prioritize the most cost effective measures to achieve stream system improvements.



MAJOR WATERSHED BASINS REPRESENTED BY ROUNDTABLES

The following basins are designated by the state of Colorado*:

Arkansas Basin: Home to two large cities - Colorado Springs and Pueblo - the Arkansas Basin has seen a great deal of growth over the past few years. Colorado Basin: The Colorado Mainstream Basin encompasses approximately 9,830 square miles and includes Grand Junction and Glenwood Springs.

Gunnison Basin: The Gunnison Basin stretches over 8,000 square miles of western Colorado and includes the cities of Montrose, Delta and Gunnison.

 Metro Basin: The Metro Roundtable is the only roundtable not designated out of a natural hydrological river basin. The Metro region's unique needs and water uses necessitated its designation apart from the South Platte River Basin (within which it lies).

 North Platte Basin: The North Platte Basin is located in north central Colorado in Jackson County and a small portion of Larimer County, covering roughly 2,050 square miles.

• *Rio Grande Basin*: The Rio Grande Basin encompasses approximately 8,000 square miles, including the San Luis Valley.

• South Platte Basin: The South Platte Basin Roundtable covers approximately 22,000 square miles in northeast Colorado.

• Southwest Basin: The Southwest Basin covers approximately 10,169 square miles in southwest Colorado. Its major rivers include the San Juan River, Animas River, Dolores River and San Miguel River.

• Yampa/White Basin: The Yampa/White Basin covers roughly 10,500 square miles in northwest Colorado and south-central Wyoming.

The group recently submitted a pH TMDL to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, Water Quality Control Division for review. The CDPHE posted the pHTMDL for public review along with a DO TMDL Addendendum. BMW submitted comments on both documents and is currently waiting for the CDPHE to respond to comments. When comments on the TMDL documents are resolved and finalized, they will be submitted to the EPA for approval.



Aurora is not anticipating formal adoption of the plan, but many of the concepts from the plan, especially stream daylighting where feasible, have the support of the City Council and staff. Making extensive use of landscape architecture Vision Sketches, WCC explored possibilities for restoration in the nine-block reach between 11th Avenue and Montview Boulevard. Working with the Urban Drainage & Flood Control District, Aurora & Denver, WCC prepared a Greenway Master Plan that will achieve goals of flood protection, recreation & aesthetics, community connectivity, and economic redevelopment.
