The River Watch Program is a statewide, water quality monitoring program for citizen scientists of all ages. This program, which is a partnership with Colorado Parks & Wildlife, is comprised of volunteers from over 125 different public, private, and charter school groups, watershed organizations, and private individuals who monitor over 300 different river sites throughout Colorado each year, making the program the largest

The Inflow Network is an electronic information network designed to engage water interested groups and citizens in state water policy and provide up to date information, such as funding opportunities, job openings, trainings and events. Because the Inflow works to bring attention to local watershed efforts, member news keeps this network relevant. Send in your news and events to keep the community informed of what you do. Watershed Planning - The Assembly continues to work with our member groups and funding partners to create a useful resource for local watershed planning efforts. Annual Conference – The Colorado Watershed Assembly hosts the Sustaining Colorado Watersheds Conference each year as a collaborative effort with the Colorado Foundation for Water Education and the Colorado Riparian Association. ## **HIGHLIGHTS**

#### STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

The 2012 Sustaining Colorado Watersheds Conference, Water 2012, in Avon, CO was our best conference yet, with interactive workshops, engaging speakers, and energizing networking opportunities. Over 200 participants found the conference to be a highly valuable opportunity and recognize the importance in our efforts to connect watershed groups with statewide resources.

#### CITIZEN SCIENCE

The Colorado Watershed Assembly continues to be a leader in citizen science. We were proud to renew our River Watch partnership with Colorado Parks and Wildlife in 2013.

River Watch continues to increase its number of volunteers through successful trainings held twice a year. This year, River Watch is welcoming 11 new volunteer water quality monitoring teams, bringing the total number of teams to 128 monitoring over 300 sites throughout the state.

River Watch was awarded a number of important grants this year, including those from the Xcel Energy Foundation and the Subaru of America Foundation (photo below with the Golden High School River Watch team).

#### WATERSHED PLANNING

The Assembly's Watershed Planning Program continues to support local groups in their watershed planning efforts. In 2013, the Colorado Watershed Assembly assisted the Chatfield Watershed Authority with meeting facilitation and increased stakeholder support for the Chatfield Watershed Plan, the Purgatorie Watershed Partnership with organizational support, and the Uncompangre Watershed Partnership with grant compliance and fiscal agency.

#### **HEALTHY RIVERS FUND**


Since the establishment of the Colorado Healthy Rivers Fund in 2003, over 117,000 citizens have donated more than \$1,003,830 from their tax returns to fund more than 65 local water enhancement projects in Colorado.


